"THE FACT THAT MAN **BEARS THE DIVINE** IMAGE COULD...YET CHANGE THE WORLD."

In many ways, every day, we are reminded that the substance of life, the realities by which we live, are not the beguiling visibilities around us. Attractive clothes, money in the pocket, human applause, a car with a loud stereo, expensive trips here and there, these are not the things that truly matter. Christ was saying at least this when He pronounced that, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God" (Matt. 4:4).

We can thereby be sure that millions of people sit daily at sumptuous tables in our world, but they are in fact starving to death. Daily their minds slip further from reality because they have no invisible means of support. No one has told them that life and mental competence are sustained by a set of facts. We live by eternal truth, not by cute slogans.

It is therefore true that every one of us should regularly review the things that we know to be true, the eternal truths by which our temporal lives are sustained. This is why the Scripture says, "Therefore we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we should let them slip" (Heb.

What then are "the things which we have heard" that need regular review? In answer, we suggest ten of the important facts by which we should live. To forget these is to slip away into the shadows of epistemological nihilism, a condition from which many do not recover.

1.) There is a God. More correctly, we should say that, "There is God." The existence of the eternal God is the first principle of anything. Apart from that first fact of life, reality disappears and all is nothing. Therefore the Scripture insists, "he that comes to God must believe that He is' (Heb. 11:6).

To disbelieve in God is not a philosophy, it is a form of insanity. So the Scripture says, "The fool has said in his heart, There is no God" (Psa. 14:1). Conversely, every intelligent person says, "O Lord our Lord, how excellent is Your name in all the earth! who has set Your glory above the heavens" (Psa. 8:1).

God created the universe. One of the most instructive pronouncements of the Word of God says, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth" (Gen. 1:1). Elaborating on this, speaking about Jesus Christ, the Scripture says, "For by Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, visible and invisible, whether they be thrones, or dominions, or principalities, or powers: all things were created by Him and for Him" (Col. 1:16).

Again, speaking about Jesus Christ, the Scripture says, "You, Lord, in the beginning have laid the foundation of the earth; and the heavens are the works of Your hands" (Heb. 1:10). The universe, the world of nature, bears great evidence of its origin. The Apostle Paul declares, "For the invisible things of Him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse" (Rom. 1:20).

3.) God made man in His own image. We learn a thrilling fact about ourselves when we read "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God created He him; male and female created He them. And God blessed them, and God said to them, Be fruitful, and multiply, and fill the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moves upon the earth" (Gen. 1:27,28).

We therefore know that we are not the accidental result of a biological or chemical process. (It could not have been otherwise!) The fact that man yet bears the Divine image, if believed, could yet change the world.

4.) Man has sinned—the race has fallen. The Bible records this move against prohibition saying, "And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat, and gave also to her husband with her; and he did eat" (Gen. 3:6).

The dreadful results of this are announced in the New Testament: "Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned" (Rom. 5:12). Sin is a debilitating disease of the will; it therefore produces progressive decadance in individual lives and in the race as well. Everything in the world has been in a measure corrupted by this dreadful disease.

5.) Jesus Christ is the Son of God. As if initiating a dramatic story, which he is doing, John says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was With God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him; and without Him was not any thing made that was made. In Him was life; and the life was the light of men" (John 1:1-4).

Upon the occasion of the

death of Christ, even the centurion testified, "Truly this was the Son of God" (Matt. 27:54).

- 6.) Christ has come to this world, interrupting history. How grateful we can be that God did not stay detached in a far away heaven. Rather, He said, "Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us" (Matt. 1:23). The Apostle John also insists that God Himself has come into our midst saying, "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). The marvel of the incarnation of Christ is that He came not simply to pay us a visit but He became a human being and that forever.
- 7.) All of mankind rejected **Christ.** Christ invited Israel to believe in Him, saying, "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you that kill the prophets, and stone them which are sent to you, how often would I have gathered your children together, even as a hen gathers her chickens under her wings, and you would not" (Matt. 23:37). Christ invited a world of individuals to Him saying, "Come to Me, all you that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28). By rejecting these invitations, humanity chose death rather than life.
- 8.) Christ died for our sins. Here we have one of the most astonishing facts of all time. Nevertheless, the Scripture clearly says that the Good News of salvation consists in the message of "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures; And that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the scriptures" (I Cor. 15:3,4).

Our astonishment continues as we read, "For he has made Him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor. 5:21). Hence we know that full and

complete payment has been made for every one of our sins. Christ has met our moral requirement by His sacrifice on the cross. We sing with Fanny Crosby, "Stay, let me weep while you whisper, Love paid the ransom for me."

- 9.) Man can be saved from sin by faith in Christ. Therefore the answer to the question, "What must I do to be saved?" is simply, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you shall be saved" (Acts 16:31). When we believe that Jesus is the Son of God and that His death on the cross is sufficient payment for sin, we are given everlasting life. So the Scripture says, "He that believes on the Son has everlasting life: and he that believes not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abides on him" (John 3:36).
- people of eternal destiny. About every Christian, Jesus says, "And I give to them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of My hand" (John 10:28). So it is that a Christian becomes eternally saved and also the possessor of everything. Speaking of the Christian the Bible says, "Whether Paul, or Apollos, or Cephas, or the world, or life, or death, or things present, or things to come; all are yours" (I Cor. 3:22).

We ponder the promise of Scripture which says, "It is a faithful saying: For if we be dead with Him, we shall also live with Him; If we suffer, we shall also reign with Him" (II Tim. 2:11,12).

These basic facts by which we live should be the object of the contemplation of the Christian more than often. There is an unfortunate amount of spiritual slippage in the Church of our time. Such dangerous defection need happen to no Christian individual. It can be prevented by regular contemplation on the Word of God and these facts by which we live.

What really is Christianity? The foregoing list would be a good start in answering that question!

THE TIDE OF OUR TIMES

SOMETHING FOR NOTHING

is the name of the game today. In thousands of places, the foolish line up to buy tickets, despite the fact that the chance of winning is millions to one. Thus, our gambling-oriented society steals from the poor and the ignorant, and government itself becomes the casino operator. The Bible says, "This we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat" (II Thess.3:10).

THE NATIONAL NEWS more and more carries the reports of the abuse of children, not only by those known to be perverted, but by religious leaders as well. We should read again the Word of God which says, "Now the Spirit speaks expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits, and doctrines of demons; Speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their conscience seared with a hot iron; Forbidding to marry, and commanding to abstain from food, which God has created to be received with thanksgiving of them which believe and know the truth" (ITim. 4:1-3).

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A "THE" MAKES. Did you read recently that Prince Charles, who stands in line to become the next King of England, has decided that he wants to change one of his titles as king? The King of England carries the additional title "Defender of the Faith," which is part of his role as head of the Church of England. The purpose of that title is for the king to preserve "THE" faith (in this case, Christianity as represented by his church) without allowing military

coercion, or doctrinal subversion, to overcome that state church. Prince Charles wants to be more

embracing--more protective of all faiths--and so he intends to move the word "the" to the front of his title. That would change it to "The Defender of

Faith"! As such, he would honor and protect Muslims, Buddhists, Animists, Hindus, etc... And as such. he would be the first king to formally abandon the Church ofEngland in principle as well as in deed. What a difference a "the" makes!

"NORTH AMERICAN JEWS are

immigrating to Israel in large numbers for the first time in decades, spurred by a growth in anti-Semitism and a belief that they might as well face terrorism in their ancestral homeland as in the United States," according to a report published by the Washington Times. "More than 400 Jews from the United States and Canada" recently arrived in Israel "to an emotional welcome" from several top Israeli officials and a former Prime Minister. Most of these were young professionals (average age 35) who have left comfortable lives in the U.S. in order to carve out a new life in the Jewish state, and although most would admit to "their strong religious or secular Zionist identity as motivating factors for

moving to Israel, many said that the events surrounding September 11 were the trigger." It seems that there is an increasingly poisonous atmosphere of hostility and outright persecution of Jews developing right here in the

United States at present and this development is also factoring in to decisions to emigrate. Said one Jewish emigre after having heard ""comments every day like: 'You Jews brought September 11 on us,'...I thought to myself, where is the one place where I would feel welcome as a Jew? Y OUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED



Q. What is the Kingdom of Heaven?

A. The Kingdom of Heaven is the special subject of the preaching of Christ in the Gospel of Matthew. Christ initiated

His earthly ministry with the announcement of the Kingdom. From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

What then is the Kingdom? It is an actual, political entity ruled by Christ which would bring the blessed conditions of heaven to the earth itself.

Jesus said, "After this manner therefore pray ye: Our Father, which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven" (Matt. 6:9,10). Sadly, the King and the Kingdom were rejected by the Jews. "They answered and said, He is guilty of death. Then did they spit in His face, and buffeted Him; and others smote Him with the palms of their hands" (Matt. 26:66,67).

Nevertheless, He is coming one day as the King. "The Son of Man shall come in His glory, and all the holy angels with Him, then shall He sit upon the throne of His glory" (Matt. 25:31). Following that, the King shall judge the nations of the world (Matt. 25:34,40).

Q. How then does the Church Age differ from the Kingdom Age?

A. There has not yet been a Kingdom Age because neither Israel nor the world has consented to the will of God being done "in earth as it is in heaven."

This, however, is the Church Age. What is happening now is described in the book of Acts, "Simeon has declared how God at the first did visit the Gentiles, to take out of them a people for His name" (Acts 15:14). Then the Lord promises that "After this I will return, and will build again the tabernacle of David, which is fallen down; and I will build again the ruins thereof, and I will set it up" (Acts 15:16).

The Church exists in the interim period in which the tabernacle of David is in ruins. When the Church is taken out of the world, the "Gospel of the Kingdom" will again be preached. The Kingdom of Heaven will then come on earth for 1,000 unforgettable years (Rev. 20:4). The Church and the Kingdom are specifically **not** the same thing.

Q. Why was the Kingdom program for Israel set aside and the Church Age begun?

A. Christ offered to regather Israel and rule them but, as He said, "You would not!" (Matt. 23:37). Therefore, the house of Israel was left desolate and will be so until they say "Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord" (Matt. 23:39). In the meantime, the Lord ordained "the Body of Christ" to be created and perfected in this world (Eph. 1:23).

Q. Has God then cast away His people, Israel?

A. The Apostle Paul faces this very question and says, "Godforbid" (Rom. 11:1). He then gives us two reasons by which we know that God has yet a remaining program for Israel.

The first reason is that Paul himself was saved by faith in Christ. This offer is made to every Jew and every Gentile today. Therefore, if we

believe in Christ we are made members of His Body.

Secondly, God has not cast away Israel because He foreknew them. The Scripture therefore predicts that Israel will one day repent and turn to Jesus as its Messiah. This will take place during the period called "The Tribulation," preparing Israel for the Millennial reign of Christ.

Q. How does the law apply to my life as a Christian?

A. When we use the expression "the law" in regards to Scripture, we are doubtless referring to the law of Moses. As Christians, we must think of the law in two ways.

First of all, the law is established as the expression of God's standard of righteousness for faith. Paul says, "We establish the law" (Rom. 3:31). We are not, however, required to keep the law as the basis of our salvation. Rather, "Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us" (Gal. 3:13). Paul insists that we are "Justified by faith apart from the deeds of the law" (Rom. 3:28).

Q. What then must I do to be saved?

A. Concerning this the Scripture says, "God imputes righteousness without works...Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin" (Rom. 4:6,8). Therefore, salvation comes "to him that works not, but believes on Him that justifies the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness" (Rom. 4:5). I can do nothing to be saved except believe the Gospel as a result of which I am saved eternally.

Q. Who then can be saved?

A. The Scripture says, "Whosoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:16).

THINKING TOGETHER

FACING THE CHALLENGING FUTURE

Each of us is moving through this mysterious continuum called "time." While we don't know exactly what time is, we know that it is transporting us, like it or not, into the future. Try as we may to hold onto yesterday or even today, still the past is taken from us. forcing us constantly to look ahead. It is impossible for us to steer the speeding craft of our lives except by looking ahead. The reality of life allows us no other possibility. This being the case, we must learn how to face this challenging thing called "the future." The fact is that the future is a friend to all of those who prepare for it. It is the enemy of all who would take their eyes off the path ahead.

But this whole matter of facing the future is viewed with increasing apprehension by the hapless worldlings of our time. They see the present generation as filled with peril and therefore their lives increasingly beset by unprecedented and unmanageable forms of danger. This attitude is understandable for the person of the world, for indeed the Bible says, "This know also, that in the last days perilous times shall come" (II Tim. 3:1).

Facing the future is not the same thing, however, for the child of God. This because he knows many things which the world does not know and these things become principles by which life can be lived successfully. In fact, the perceptive Christian is filled with anticipation about the exciting path that lies ahead. Facing the future,

how may I do this successfully? In answer to that question, we have a number of principles made clear in the Bible which we do well to keep in mind.

The first is that life is dynamic, it is not static. The Apostle Paul mentions this exactly when he says, "Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after" (Phil. 3:12). Upon reading this, along with checking the lessons of life already, we see clearly that there is never a time when we can safely rest on our laurels. Every new day that we live brings a package of unanticipated events including new opportunities and new dangers. Never, therefore, are we wise to say, "Now I know it all. I have established a course of action that will never fail and I have learned all the lessons which I need to learn."

If we hold this static point of view, we may be sure that God will drop into our life a new consideration, a gain, a loss, a twist in our circumstances for which we are very ill prepared. We may plan life as we will, but we will never be delivered from those things which are not included in the plan. Yes, life is a very dynamic thing. Therefore, the just must live by faith.

A second principle concerning this matter of facing the future is to remember that **the past should not unduly influence our anticipation of the days to come.** Paul puts it, "forgetting those things which are behind" (Phil. 3:13). The past contains the remembrance of many

things that perhaps can be boiled down into two departments. The first is "past failures." Past failures should not cast a pall over the events of today and especially tomorrow.

We must remember that God has made provision in the life of every Christian to wipe away the failures of the past. He has said, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse usfrom all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9). A great deliverance from the cloying weights of the past can come to every Christian by invoking this promise in the Word of God. To be cleansed from all unrighteousness is a great present gift from God. Indeed, it is one of the derivative benefits of the finished work of Christ on Calvary's cross.

A second department of the past is "past successes." It is one of the mysteries of life that often our successes do us more harm than our failures. The reason is that we learn much from failure, but more than often success merely produces pride. Most honest people will quickly confess that their successes came mostly by accident. It was a matter of being in the right place at the right time rather than great cleverness on their part. Thank God for success; but if the result is sinful pride, success is worse than failure.

A <u>third principle</u> to keep in mind as we look to the future is

that life must be lived with intensity. Paul put it best by saying, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:14). The apostle did not say "I drift toward the mark," "I meander toward the mark," "I float toward the mark." Not at all! There is no worthy success in life except that which comes from a degree of personal intensity.


In fact, it can surely be said that one of the strangest contradictions on earth is that of casual Christianity. It is a breathless anomaly for Christians to profess to believe that there is a heaven to gain and a hell to shun and then be relaxed and casual about bringing that message to the world. C. T. Studd spoke well when he said, "If Jesus be God and He died for me, then no sacrifice is too great for me to make for Him." We have talked entirely too much about relaxation and stress reduction. To an army marching into battle, these expressions incomprehensible.

Finally, we must remember the fourth principle that there is a great prize at the end of the course. Paul called this the "prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 3:14). "The high calling," what an expression! The trajectory of the life of a Christian leads to the broad vistas of heaven. There we shall know even as we are known and therefore rejoice with joy unspeakable in what we may have accomplished for Christ.

Facing the future is therefore done by realizing that

life is a vastly important thing with its consequences in eternity. Our plans for the future, therefore, should not be made simply to steer us along the path of convenience. They should rather be based on the question, "What can I do with the one life I will live in this world which I can then present to my Lord before his Judgment Seat?"

Yes, each one of us shall give an account of himself to God. Nothing will be more important in the initial stages of heaven than to hear Jesus say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant... Enter thou into the joy of thy lord" (Matt. 25:21). The real future is not merely the year to come, it is the eternity that is before us.



FINALLY
